

From the Benefice Ministry Team

I'm writing this on the 12th day of Christmas. Somewhat disappointingly, I didn't receive a gift of twelve drummers drumming from my true love, although I have to admit I'm not sure what I'd have done with them if I had! Our Christmas decorations came down today – as is the tradition – and were put away for another year, and suddenly the house looks very bare. In the church calendar, the Christmas season lasts until Candlemas on 2nd February and in many parts of the world Christmas trees are left up until then. I suspect my tree would be devoid of all needles by then and looking very sorry for itself!



The 12th day of Christmas falls on the eve of Epiphany, and on the next day, 6th January, we celebrate the Epiphany, the revelation of God incarnate in Jesus Christ. It's a special date in the Christmas story as it's when we celebrate how a star led the three Magi – also known as the Wise Men or Three Kings – to the baby Jesus, bringing with them their gifts fit for a King. Their visit is very significant as it reveals that Emmanuel – God among us in Jesus Christ – came not just to be King of the Jews but to be the saviour of all peoples of all nations. This king, the Messiah, would bring God's justice and peace to the whole world, and indeed at the end of Matthew's gospel Jesus commissions his followers to go out and make disciples from every nation.

For many of us 1st January is the day to make New Year's resolutions, but I've long abandoned this. All too often the commitments I made were all around chocolate and calories and I would cave in after about three weeks. Some years ago I wondered if it would be more meaningful if I were to wait until Epiphany when all the hustle and bustle of Advent and Christmas is over and the fridge is emptied of all the delicious Christmas and New Year leftovers. I wondered if I'd then have the space and time to think about some more meaningful resolutions: resolutions not centred on me but centred on my commitment as a disciple of Jesus in my day to day living, and on how I can use my time and whatever talents God has entrusted to me to play my part in making the transforming love of Jesus known to others.

Epiphany may be just the time to bring to God the gift of a renewed commitment to our lives lived in Christ. At our first Sunday service after Christmas we said together the Methodist prayer – said each year at a special Covenant Service – which celebrates all that God has done for us, and we in turn affirm that we give our lives and choices to God. The prayer is a wonderful way to commit ourselves afresh at the start of a new year and is an important part of my Epiphany (rather than New Year) resolutions:

*I am no longer my own but yours.
 Put me to what you will,
 rank me with whom you will;
 put me to doing,
 put me to suffering *;
 let me be employed for you,
 or laid aside for you,
 exalted for you,
 or brought low for you;
 let me be full,
 let me be empty,
 let me have all things,
 let me have nothing:
 I freely and wholeheartedly yield all things
 to your pleasure and disposal.
 And now, glorious and blessed God,
 Father, Son and Holy Spirit,
 you are mine and I am yours. So be it.
 And the covenant now made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven.
 Amen.*

* Note that in this prayer the word ‘suffering’ is used in the sense of ‘patiently enduring’ - the opposite of ‘doing’. We’re not inviting God to inflict pain on us!

Happy New Year to all. May God bless us richly in 2022 and in turn may we may be a blessing to others.

Services online or telephone based

With some parishioners not in a position to attend church services, the streamed services are continuing. Most services from All Saints, Odiham, are live-streamed (and then available online afterwards) – see the website www.moretolife.church for details.

In addition to streamed services, the Church of England has established ‘Daily Hope’, a telephone line offering music, prayers and reflections as well as full worship services from the Church of England. The line, which is available 24 hours a day on 0800 804 8044, has been set up particularly with those unable to join online church services in mind.

Private prayer

In this group of four churches, St Mary’s, Upton Grey, is open every day – generally in daylight hours. St Lawrence, Weston Patrick, is open Monday–Saturday (and Sunday if there is a service), usually from 9.00am to 5.00pm though times may vary. St Mary’s, Herriard, and All Saints, Tunworth, are available for private prayer on the same basis as before Covid.



We all sometimes worry we're not good enough... worry we won't be clever enough to pass our test, fast enough to get into the team... it's natural. But worrying about not being good isn't good for any of us. It can make us anxious, sad and full of doubt. In the Bible it says being full



of doubt and worry is like trying to walk through stormy waves – you'll never get anywhere! There's a saying that says 'a worry shared is a worry halved'. So why don't we think about how we can share any worries we have?

Obviously, one good way of sharing your worries is to find an adult you trust and tell them what you're worried about – they can give you advice and be there for you. Another great way of doing this is to make yourself a worry jar.

- Find a jar or any container, and decorate it if you like.
- Write your worries on pieces of paper. Fold them up and put them in the jar, and close the jar.
- Choose a time with a trusted adult (not just before bed!) when you can open the jar and share your worries.
- Set a 10-minute timer, and when it finishes close the jar to put your worries away.
- When you've stopped worrying about something, enjoy ripping that worry up and throwing it away!

NEWS FROM THE VILLAGES

Police Report from PCSO Andy Jones

Officers have arrested four men following reports of poaching near Upton Grey. We were called just after 9.00pm on Thursday 6th January to reports that a vehicle had been spotted acting suspiciously on Bidden Road. Officers attended the scene and found catapults, ball bearings and head torches after conducting a search of the local area. Officers also found a quantity of dried blood and what appeared to be pheasant feathers inside a vehicle. Four men were arrested at the scene.

A 36-year-old man, from Carshalton, was arrested on suspicion of trespassing on land at night and taking/destroying game.

A 35-year-old man, from Mitcham, was arrested on suspicion of trespassing on land at night and taking/destroying game.

A 30-year-old man, from Hersham, was arrested on suspicion of trespassing on land at night and taking/destroying game.

An 18-year-old man, from Carshalton, was arrested on suspicion of trespassing on land at night and taking/destroying game. They all remain in custody and our enquiries are ongoing.

The Police helicopter was dispatched from RAF Benson and the area was totally surrounded without the criminals knowing their every move was being monitored. A special thanks to the local gamekeepers and Farmers for reporting this and their assistance in this apprehension.

The incident was reported as follows in the Hampshire and IoW news:

Police helicopter took just 19 minutes to locate four suspects arrested last night in Basingstoke for poaching offences.

A police helicopter crew had a busy night supporting local forces in their fight against rural crime – assisting in the arrest of 13 people in two separate incidents and proving its value in night-time searches.

Just two days after the Government's announcement to introduce tougher sentencing and improved police powers to tackle hare coursing, crews from the National Police Air Service's Benson base were successfully deployed to support local forces responding to reports of rural crime.

Chief Inspector of NPAS Operations, Warren Pitman, said: 'The ability of our helicopter crews to search large areas very quickly, with the added advantage of lighting and thermal imaging equipment to assist at night time, makes them a valuable resource, especially when working in rural areas. Our officers are able to directly communicate with officers on the ground, and live-stream their video footage into force control

rooms. This combined effort means that it is difficult to evade detection. We are pleased to be able to support forces across England and Wales in their drive to combat rural crime.'

At around 10.30pm on Thursday 6 January 2022, the NPAS Benson crew were informed of reports of poaching in the Basingstoke area of Hampshire. Within nine minutes of taking off, they arrived at the scene and located a suspect vehicle. After a quick search of the nearby area the Tactical Flight Officer directed officers from Hampshire to the location of four suspects, who were detained. They were arrested on suspicion of trespassing on land at night and taking/destroying game. Total air support tasking time was 19 minutes.

The same evening, the crew were asked to support officers at Thames Valley Police in a suspected hare coursing incident. Nine people aged between 16 and 30 were arrested. A number of dogs were also seized. Total air support tasking time was one hour and 45 minutes.

Theft from vehicles remains on the increase within the rural areas in general. Previous advice from Police was not to leave anything of value in your car and certainly not on display when leaving your vehicle unattended.

We are seeing a new trend and that is criminals are smashing rear boot windows and lifting up the parcel shelf to have a quick search for items which may be of value or interest to them. Local Police have reviewed the advice and suggest, if practical, to consider the removal of your parcel shelf when leaving the vehicle in rural locations. The thought behind this is that if criminals can see the whole of the car is empty the hope is that they won't even bother targeting the car. The Police understand this not ideal and we are working behind the scenes to tackle this increase.

Farming News

All is quiet on the Arable farm at this time of year and it is a relatively relaxing feeling this year, as all the autumn-sown crops have been planted and are now coming up and showing a green tinge across the fields. I looked back at my last article and it was pre maize harvesting. Looking back now I was very optimistic! After the crops looked well through the summer, and the weather being relatively kind through the early Autumn, could we have been in for the dry maize harvest that we always pray for?

But it was just too good to be true! After being held up with several frustrating breakdowns on the bagging machine (this is what the maize is stored in, once harvested) and the weather deciding to break, it delayed the last crop to be harvested. Having said that, the contractor did a great job in cutting the maize and was very patient. We got the last field cut, and harvest was finished on 24th October. After the last two very wet autumns we were due a dry one and, after the early rain, November was relatively dry – which meant we could plant the last of the wheat into reasonable conditions and even the last fields drilled are coming up now minus the odd wet corner. As I write this in early December, the only jobs we have pressing are to wash off all the equipment and to service it before the spring planting begins. Also we will be starting to trim roadside and field hedges now we have given wildlife a chance to feed off of any fruit or nuts found in hedgerows. On the jobs list as well is finishing off building some field-gate barriers to block gateways from unwanted poachers!

Thank you to everyone that has visited our small shop in the farmyard at the weekends. It has been great to be able to sell produce from the farm to our friends and neighbours in the parish. Dad has even made some bread from home-grown wheat that we had milled into flour.

Wishing everyone a happy New Year from all of us at Hyde Farm.

Herriard Gardening Club

As I write this in early January, the temperature outside is 1°C with blue skies and sunshine. Mid-winter gardens look monochrome and scruffy round the edges but cold weather is a good thing for gardens; it's a time of dormancy and rest.

Apples, pears and plums need a period of cold weather in order to come into growth in spring. A process known as vernalisation, reduced daylight hours, induce the trees to go into a dormant state. Deciduous trees are also dormant and waiting for temperatures to rise to burst into growth and bloom. Pruning of apple and pear trees should happen when the trees are dormant between November and early March to promote a healthy shape, encourage flowering and ensure good fruiting.

Herbaceous perennials stop growing in winter and all top growth dies back. Cold weather gives herbaceous plants a chance to convert starch to sugars. They store carbohydrates they make from water and CO₂ in their roots as starch. The onset of cold weather triggers enzymes in the root to convert the starch back into sugars. They are then ready to send up new shoots in spring. This process, sparked by cold weather is also the reason why a number of winter vegetables such as parsnip, taste better after they are exposed to frost.

You can keep the dead leaves of herbaceous plants over winter to provide homes for wildlife and cut them back in spring. Penstemons

benefit from the protection of old stems from frost to protect the crown. Leave pruning these and other borderline tender plants until the risk of frost has passed.

Biennials such as wallflowers, sweet Williams and aquilegias also need a period of cold weather to produce flowers the following spring. The same goes for flowering bulbs which need different weather conditions throughout the year to produce flowers the following spring. The cold weather stimulates stem growth on flowering bulbs.

Some seeds require stratification or cold treatment in order for them to sprout. Seed stratification, or embryonic dormancy phase is the process whereby seed dormancy is broken in order to promote germination. Conditions in nature are mimicked, so the period in the ground over winter can be reproduced by placing seeds in a fridge for ten days on moist kitchen paper in a ziplock bag, then taken out and planted. Check which seeds require cold treatment.

So while we tend to spend far less time in the garden in winter, it's a good time to reflect, plan the coming year's vegetable crop rotations, prune fruit trees and look forward to the first spring bulbs appearing now the days are getting longer. Enjoy your garden.

Alton Cardiac Rehab: ‘Get off the couch, Before it’s too late’

Like most of us, you probably know you need to keep fit – but just why is it so vital? And what sort of exercise should you be doing – how often, how hard and for how long? Perhaps you feel you are fit already – but how much exercise are you really taking? What are the consequences of our increasingly sedentary lifestyles?

The book ‘Get off the couch, Before it’s too late’ by Hugh Bethell explains exactly how exercise affects our bodies and its crucial role in preventing and treating many of the conditions that beset us as we advance in age – obesity, heart disease, stroke, diabetes, high blood pressure and more. At a time when the previously steady increase in life expectancy across the nation has stalled and the period of poor health and dependency at the end of life has lengthened, it is a wake-up call for every one of us, young or old, to understand the importance of an active lifestyle.

The Covid pandemic has thrown a stark light on the vulnerability of those who take too little exercise. Most of those who have become very unwell or died have been overweight, unfit and/or suffering one or more degenerative diseases of old age – all the long-term results of being inactive.

How to identify the UK's five owls – Hampshire & IoW Wildlife Trust

Owls are among our most captivating birds and, with a good view, are easily distinguished from other UK birds. But how to tell one owl from another? Here's a guide to the UK's five resident species:

Barn owl

A very pale, slender owl, typically white on the underparts and golden-brown with grey markings on the upperparts. It has a white, heart-shaped facial disk with dark eyes. Usually seen over grassland or farmland at dawn and dusk, it can also be seen at night or even during the day. Its call resembles eerie squeals and a shrieking 'shreeee'.

Tawny owl

A mostly brown owl with a large, rounded head. Slightly larger than a barn owl and usually seen in woodland. Plumage is mottled brown but can vary from greyish to reddish brown. In flight, it shows broad, rounded wings and flies with quick wingbeats in long, straight glides. The tawny's rich vocal repertoire includes a short 'ke-wik' contact call and a quavering 'hoo, hu-hooo' advertising call.

Short-eared owl

A sandy-brown owl similar in size to a tawny, but with longer wings. It has a streaked breast, but a pale, un-marked belly with thick dark barring on the tail and piercing yellow eyes. In flight, it shows long, narrow wings that are slightly longer and slimmer than long-eared owls, with black wingtips. It flies with slow wingbeats and wavering glides. Males perform display flights at breeding grounds, giving a fast series of deep hoots and short, quick wing-claps. Other calls include rapid, rasping barks when alarmed.

Long-eared owl

This streaky brown owl looks very similar to a short-eared owl but has darker feathers and less of a yellow hue. The facial disk is buff with a well-defined blackish border and white 'eyebrows' extending towards the beak. It has deep orange eyes and long 'ear-tufts' atop the head. In

flight, it's tricky to tell from the short-eared owl: it has slightly shorter and more blunt-tipped wings, with fine black barring on the wingtips and no white trailing edge to the upper wing. Males advertise with deep, soft hoots without inflection given every few seconds, while females have a more nasal call.


Little owl

A small owl with a flattened crown. The upperparts are dark brown with whitish streaks and spots, with whitish underparts featuring bold brown streaks. Facial disk is greyish brown with prominent whitish 'eyebrows' giving a stern expression. Eyes are yellow. It flies with a fast, bounding flight like a thrush, and hunts by swooping from perches, but it will also run across ground to pursue prey. The little owl's various calls include a fast 'chi-chi-chi' alarm call, a low-pitched hoot and a mewling call.

The importance of Ivy

Ivy has an image problem. For decades, people have believed that ivy damages buildings and is a parasite to trees with little wildlife benefit. It is common to see that well-meaning farmers and gardeners have cut down ivy stalks at the base of trees with the intention of protecting the host tree. But this is a mistake.

It is a very common belief that ivy ‘strangles’ the tree it climbs, hastening its demise. However this is not the case – Ivy is not a parasitic plant and does not directly affect the health of its host tree. The only way in which ivy can damage trees is by competing for natural light. But this usually happens only if the host tree is already in a state of decline, as most healthy trees create too much shade of their own to allow ivy to outstrip them. Only in the case of an already diseased or dying tree, the ivy’s more vigorous growth allows it to smother the tree, causing it to become top-heavy and hastening its fall. This is an advantage in woodland habitats in that it allows light to the ground below, enabling new trees more quickly to take its place.

Before removing ivy from trees, please remember the enormous benefits for wildlife that ivy provides. The dense mass of foliage and intertwining stems around the trunks of trees give shelter for birds’ nests and daytime roosts for bats. In Autumn, ivy flowers provide pollen and nectar for butterflies, bees, wasps and flies. Over winter, ivy protects woodland soils from full snow cover and frost. This enables ground-foraging birds such as blackbirds, robins, dunnocks and thrushes to continue feeding and gives shelter to small mammals and insects. The berries, which ripen in spring, have a high fat content and, provide birds with an invaluable early energy resource.

As a result, it should rarely be considered necessary or appropriate to remove ivy from naturally growing trees. Only with ornamental trees or clipped hedges can it become a genuine problem. Please remember, though, that if you do decide to remove ivy from your trees or hedges, do so in late summer or autumn, when birds will no longer be nesting and before bats begin to hibernate.

Incidentally – if you want to research this yourself online, make sure you look at English websites only. English ivy is an alien species in America, is therefore harmful to some indigenous species, and consequently gets a very bad press! 
